

LET'S PLAY 4-H ANIMAL JEOPARDY!!

OBJECTIVE:

Students will understand and appreciate that animals of the same species may be called different names depending on age, sex, individual or group, etc.

ANIMAL JEOPARDY

Today's lesson is about animals.

How many people here like animals?

How many you have a pet?

Does anyone here have livestock like cows or horses or sheep?



Introduce the lesson.

Ask the class each question in turn. Call on a few students to share their response about each question.

Be Careful! The class will be very excited about this lesson. Make sure you pick only those students who raise their hands. Be prepared to stop the lesson and calm the class down.

ANIMAL JEOPARDY

There are many different animals in the world and only a small number of those will be found around our homes and farms.

There are quite a few wild animals in the world that we know about but never see except in books and on TV.

In our lesson, we are going to see how much you know about the different names that animals are called.



After the first two paragraphs, ask the class to name some:

- common animals we see around our homes and farms
- Wild animals we see in books and on TV

Again, make sure the class raises their hands!

The last point tells the class what we are going to learn in our lesson, that is the different names animals are called, even if they are of the same species.

ANIMAL JEOPARDY

We are going to test your knowledge of animal names today.

As you know, animals of the same species can be called different names depending on whether they are male or female, young or old, etc.

Since we also use animals for food, we need to know what animals are called when they are in our human food supply.

We will also ask you some fun questions about animals, just to see how much you know and just how well you like our animal friends.

This slides states exactly what we are going to learn.

Explain what a 'species' is: a group of individual animals having common attributes and being capable of having offspring.

Species comes from the word specific. The species name is the specific name of a similar group of animals.

Example: Boa constrictor is one of five species of the Boa genus. Boa is the genus, constrictor is the species.

ANIMAL JEOPARDY

We are now going to play a game to test your knowledge of animals. This a "Jeopardy-type" game and we will divide into three teams. Each team will have a team captain and that captain will select the questions for the team and will also give the answer. The captain will ask the team for help in determining the correct answer for each question. If one team gives the wrong answer, the question goes on to the next team until someone gets the right answer or all three teams have had a chance. The team with the most points at the end of the game wins.

This slide transitions to the jeopardy game. Single jeopardy is on this file and follows this slide.

Double jeopardy is a separate file. So after finishing single jeopardy, you will have to close this file and open double jeopardy.

Make sure you explain the next month's contests before leaving.

Give yourselves 5 minutes to give out ribbons and explain the next contest(s).

SEWING CONTEST CATEGORIES:

Clothing	Any article of clothing. Examples could include shorts, vest, skirts, etc.
Toys	Stuffed toys, doll clothes, or other cloth toys
Clothing Accessories	Caps, hats, aprons, purses, ponchos, travel kits, belts, backpacks, etc.
Other Sewn items	Pillows, quilts, or any sewn item that has not been listed.
Miscellaneous	Cross stitch, embroidery, crochet, knitting

SEWING CONTEST GENERAL RULES:

1. Name, grade, and club name must be attached to the entry.
2. The 4-H member must sew the entry on his or her own. Entries can be hand or machine sewn. 4-H member's may receive guidance and direction from a parent or adult; however, the actual construction must be the work of the 4-H member.
3. One item may be entered in each category.
4. Items may also be entered in the 4-H section of the Claiborne County Fair in August. Clothing items may be entered in the Regional Fashion Show held during Fashion and Design Conference.

The categories are:

1. Animal(s)
2. People or Person
3. Building(s)
4. Landscape
5. Plant(s)

Label your photos with the category on the back. 4-H members may enter only one photo in each category. Photos must not be mounted together on a poster board.

(Photos must be labeled by category with the 4-H member's first and last name.)

Remember to enter your photos and sewing in the Claiborne County Fair!
