## Research Update: Parenting and Teen Driving

Li, K., Simons-Morton, B. G., Brooks-Russell, A., Ehsani, J., & Hingson, R. (2014). Drinking and parenting practices as predictors of impaired driving behaviors among U.S. adolescents. *Journal of Studies on Alcohol and Drugs*, 75, 5-15.

Substance use among teenagers is associated with an increased risk of Driving while Intoxicated (DWI) and Riding while Intoxicated (RWI). This study aimed to ascertain how 10th grade substance use and parental practices predicted 11th grade driving and riding while intoxicated.

### Key Findings:


- Heavy episodic drinking in 10th grade predicted a higher probability of DWI and RWI in 11th grade.
- Father's monitoring knowledge forecasted lower DWI.
- Mother's monitoring knowledge predicted lower RWI.

The study suggests that enhancing parenting practices "could potentially discourage adolescent DWI" (p. 5). Also, the study suggests that parental practices of fathers and mothers may affect "adolescent impaired-driving behaviors" differently (p. 5).
